- Akeya Carter-Bozman
 - Became the new director of Title IX's Prevention and Education in January
 - 3 target areas for prevention and education: Athletics, SGA, and Greek Life—Greek life
 MUST complete Title IX training before they can rush
 - Rewrote plan for peer advocates; they do not respond to crisis calls. Primary goal is to be facilitators and disseminators of information. Required to do Mental Health First Aid, learn about bystander intervention, and what to do if someone is drunk
 - Peer advocates must facilitate 3 sessions to pass the class. Akeya teaches 300 level, Cortney Simmons teaches 400 level—passing 300 does not guarantee acceptance to 400; they must have an invitation by Akeya or Cortney to register for 400.
 - Goal is not to have a lot of advocates, but to keep advocates who will stay for a few years and will do community projects and educational presentations. Want to prepare them to be advocates in the community after they have left WVU and are no longer part of Title IX.
- Meredith Linger
 - Hospital Updates: In July, 5 patients received SAFE exam—2 prepubescent children (officially surpassing child sexual assaults from 2018) and 3 adults/adolescents.
 - 2019 year-to-date: 66 patients. 20 prepubescent children, 46 adults/adolescents.
- John Sedoski
 - National White Collar Crime Center (NW3C)
 - focus on empowering investigators and prosecutors with training and technical assistance, with an emphasis on digital evidence
- Robert Peters
 - SHIELD (See, Hear, Intervene, Empower, Learn, Defend) reporting initiative—is a WV non-profit; working on 501C designation
 - Target audience—schools and churches. School assemblies are most successful for disclosure.
 - Mission—mobilize statewide coalition
